Message from the Chair of The Board

Chairman's Report to the 2018 Annual General Meeting of the Olive Tree Foundation



It is my great privilege to present this report on the activities of the Olive Tree Foundation during 2018.

The Olive Tree Foundation is a volunteer-run public foundation that is dedicated to enhancing community life through responsible grant making in Canada. As a philanthropic organization that promotes community development we are seeking to build the Foundation to occupy a clear, distinctive, and desirable place in the minds of donors, volunteers, and partners.

In this regard, the Olive Tree Foundation has distinguished itself for funding innovative projects and for its governance and transparency over the years. As a result of the returns from the endowments and the funds raised during 2018, we were able to provide grants to fund some worthwhile projects.

GRANTS

In 2018, the Olive Tree Foundation awarded a grant to DEEN Support Services for the project, "*Count Us In: Mapping the Needs of Muslims with Disabilities.*"

The project will help develop a demographic profile of Muslims with disabilities in Ontario in order to raise awareness, plan for and implement appropriate services, not only in the Muslim community, but also in the mainstream. Through comprehensive outreach, the project will solicit input from Muslims with disabilities and their caregivers in an online province-wide survey and multilingual interviews in the GTA, Ottawa and London-Windsor regions. Over a decade ago, the Olive Tree Foundation funded this newly formed organization to conduct their first community-based research that resulted in a pioneering report. The report was used by the organization to educate, advocate and build support in the community for services for persons with disabilities.

The Olive Tree Foundation also awarded a grant to the Ottawa Muslim Association for the project, "*Know Your Rights, Know Your Responsibilities: A Pocket Guide for Canadian Muslims.*" The National Council of Canadian Muslims (NCCM) will develop the project in partnership with the Ottawa Muslim Association.

The *Know Your Rights Video Series* project is a visualization of parts of the NCCM's forthcoming publication, *Know Your Rights, Know Your Responsibilities: A Pocket Guide for Canadian Muslims*. The guide was created to empower Canadian Muslims by addressing gaps in knowledge about their rights and responsibilities related to employment, travel, social and commercial services, healthcare, law enforcement, national security, and citizenship. The video series is part of NCCM's broader *Know Your*

Rights dissemination strategy to provide Canadian Muslims with multiple access points to, what is for many, inaccessible language of legal rights.

This past year we were also pleased to sponsor the *Interfaith Bee Garden Play Space* at the Parliament of the World's Religions held in Toronto from November 1 - 7, 2018. The Bee Garden educated children and youth at the Parliament on the importance of stewardship of God's Earth and its importance in Islam.

The *Interfaith Bee Garden Play Space* was constructed out of recyclable materials and consisted of an oversized flower at the entrance, followed by a winding path with obstacles for the learner to go over and under, until they reach a large wall of 3D hexagons, representing a honeycomb. This Bee Garden was well received by participants at this international convention that was attended by 10,000 people from around the globe.

SCHOLARSHIP & BURSARY AWARDS

The "Scholarship and Bursary Awards", which is offered annually by the Olive Tree Foundation continues to support students and gain attention across the country.

A highly professional and competent team of educators who form the Scholarship and Bursary Awards Committee administers the awards. The awards are given to students entering full-time programs of study at a college or university in the upcoming academic year. The awards are funded by endowment funds of the Olive Tree Foundation and include the *Mohamed and Opheera Nasir Leadership Scholarship, The Faisal Ali Academic Excellence Scholarship* and three bursary awards.

During 2018, the Olive Tree Foundation continued to network with non-profit organizations and charities to discuss projects and identify areas of collaboration.

In conclusion, I would like to thank all of our members, volunteers, committees, and generous donors who have supported the Olive Tree Foundation over the past year, as well as, the recipient organizations for working along with us in our granting process.

Mission, Vision and Values

Mission

The Olive Tree Foundation (Foundation) is dedicated to promoting and perpetuating philanthropy and enhancing community life through responsible grant making in Canada.

The Foundation encourages and facilitates the creation and growth of endowment funds to enable the community to realize its potential. The Foundation maintains effective stewardship over all assets entrusted to it; distributes grants that reflect donors' wishes and community priorities; and provides leadership in the Muslim and general communities.

Values and Purpose

In 2004, civic leaders and philanthropists within the Canadian Muslim community founded The Olive Tree Foundation.

The Foundation is a charitable organization formed to attract and manage permanent endowment funds and to distribute income from those funds back to the community. We provide grants to registered charitable organizations for projects that sustain or improve quality of life in the community.

Unlike other charities, which are usually dedicated to a single cause, the Olive Tree Foundation supports a range of charitable activities in our community: social, community and health services; education and library services; policy institutes and think tanks; and arts, culture & heritage. Because of this unique mandate, we can provide seed funding for new projects or other initiatives that might otherwise fall between the cracks. Our Foundation also has a mandate to act as a catalyst for community initiatives that support and sustain our community. An endowment foundation (*Waqf*) is an institution that has been part of the Islamic historical experience and has provided for the flourishing of the Muslim contribution to societies. The establishment of such an institution in Canada will provide a vehicle for leading an ongoing legacy and contribution to the Muslim community and to Canada.

The guiding principles of the Olive Tree Foundation are to provide support where there is genuine need, build on the strengths of the community and encourage innovation and community development.





DONOR ADVISED FUNDS

Donor Advised Funds are a specific type of endowment fund which enables the donor to have ongoing participation in the grant-making process. The Olive Tree Foundation is honoured to recognize the following Donor Advised Fund:

• Ansar Healthcare Fund

A donor-advised fund called the 'Ansar Healthcare Fund' was established with Ansar Financial Group as the initial contributors. Returns from the fund will be used to improve the quality of life in the community by supporting initiatives in the health care services area.

Mohamed and Opheera Nasir Leadership Scholarship

A Field-of-Interest fund called the 'Mohamed and Opheera Nasir Leadership Scholarship' was established to honour the significant contributions to the Canadian Muslim community of late Mohamed Nasir and his wife, Opheera Nasir; and as a memorial to honour their parents Shabaan and Mohammed Nasir (parents of Opheera) and Jinette and Mohamed Ishmael (parents of Mohamed).

FIELD-OF-INTEREST FUNDS

This type of fund may be named for an individual, such as a memorial to a loved one, or for a specific purpose such as think tanks or library services. Grants are made in accordance with the priorities of the Foundation within the specific field of interest agreed upon by both parties at time of the establishment of the fund. The Faisal Ali Academic Excellence Scholarship

A Field-of-Interest fund called the 'The Faisal Ali Academic Excellence Scholarship' was set up by the late Opheera Nasir, grandmother of Faisal Ali, as a memorial to honour her grandson who will always be loved and cherished in the memories of the family.

Ghulam Sajan Leadership in Action Fund

A Field of Interest fund called the Ghulam Sajan Leadership in Action Fund was set up by Ghulam Sajan's family to honour and continue the work he was so passionate about. Ghulam Sajan was an iconic person who dedicated his life to empowering communities and encouraging them to have a voice, influence public policy and to vote. Since arriving in Canada in 1975, until he passed away in 2014, he was always remembered for his selfless efforts of helping those in need, building intra-faith and inter-faith bridges and the countless community organizations he helped build in Canada and around the world.
